PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Season 2017/18 commenced with a 1st XI captain new to the club and 2nd and 3rd XI skippers who, whilst mature players, were similarly making their captaincy debuts. They were complemented by a club legend as 4th XI skipper and as passionate a coaching group as you are likely to see in VSDCA cricket. Whilst the off-field position was strong due to the clear thinking approach of previous President, Emmett Dunne, there were plenty of unknowns as we approached a season predicated on regaining on-field respect within the VSDCA community.

A strong 6th placed finish in the prestigious KG Fewster Club Championship, a rise of nine places on our 2016/17 position, is the best indicator of the on-field strides made in 2017/18. Similarly, three teams in the finals and a grand-final spot were again evidence of our club regaining the respect of our peers, particularly in the top two grades. That was indeed satisfying and creates a great deal of optimism about what can be achieved in 2018/19.

The club could not have asked for more from its leaders. Luke Walker, Steuart Snooks, Will Kiernan and Ian Thorn were outstanding as captains creating a driven yet welcoming environment conducive to good performance.

Energetic and passionate, Peter Marshall, was simply outstanding as Club Coach taking on a role that was far from limited to the top four senior elevens as he embraced the need for young players to be given opportunity to call Malvern CC home. In addition, he found time to fill the Chairman of Selectors role with aplomb and assist with the JG Craig squad. It is so comforting to know that 'Marshy' has agreed to continue in the coaching role for another two seasons.

Assistant Coach, Peter Bedford, was similarly energised and, like Marshy, played a role stretching well beyond the senior arm of the club. His work with the 2nd XI was crucial to the team's success and his motivational words prior to the 2nd XI batting performance in the semi-final against Oakleigh was the stuff of legend.

I particularly take this opportunity to thank the skippers, coaches and indeed players who, when faced with significant challenges especially in relation to the standard of the practice wickets, simply rolled their sleeves up and got on with the job. It was symptomatic of a mature and united group and all credit to our role-models and leaders for fostering that club spirit.

Off-field the Club was again well served by a hard-working Committee. I don't propose to name everyone individually but I do wish to put on record just how hard some committee members worked.

- Peter Clifton, welcomed back with open arms, was a deserved winner of the Ewan Willis best Club Person Award with his management and oversight of the Moonlight Cinema and match day operations just part of an absolute commitment to the club.
- Emmett Dunne managed the Silent Auction single-handedly and in the process raised a significant amount for the club.
- Plod's protégé, son Liam, could not have been more willing and effective as Social Captain.

Efforts from these club members and others saw our club come out on the right side of the accounting ledger and well-placed to face the financial challenges that befall all local sporting clubs.

I take this opportunity to thank all committee members for their dedication and support for both the club and myself. It is time consuming and done on an honorary basis. Our club was very well served by an outstanding group.

The club continues to enjoy a flourishing junior program. I take this opportunity to thank Junior President, Shaun Beattie and his hard-working Committee on another successful season. One of the most pleasing aspects of the season was the greater connect between the junior and senior arms of the club. Primarily due to the efforts and encouragement of Marshy and Shaun, a number of junior and JG Craig squad cricketers got their first taste of senior cricket. It can only assist the long-term wellbeing of the club to have so many junior cricketers enjoy first-hand the benefits of senior cricket at Malvern.

Our relationship with the East Malvern branch of the Bendigo Bank and Branch Chairman, Peter Norman, in particular remains as strong as ever. Over a decade long partnership, the East Malvern Branch has donated just shy of \$100,000 to assist in maintaining the senior and junior arms of our clubs. Without that contribution our club simply does not exist in the form that we take for granted and enjoy today.

Other key sponsors, NetWealth, Malvern Vale Hotel and Jellis Craig, all made significant contributions to the club and it is incumbent on all associated with the club to support these organisations. It must be a mutually beneficial relationship.

The club is also very grateful to those President's Club members whose continued support ensures the operations of the club.

Thankfully, we maintain our positive rapport with the City of Stonnington, especially its Parks and Gardens staff. Although not always seamless, the lines of communication were always open and for this we are particularly thankful.

Our hard-working Co-Secretary, John Nethersole, will thank other key contributors individually in his report.

A key endeavour of our social regime was to maintain a connect with Past Players and Supporters thereby ensuring our long and storied history remains at the forefront of our consciousness. To that end, as part of the President's Club Luncheon initiative, we celebrated the 1973/74 1st XI Group Premiership. Despite seriously inclement weather, 17 of the 18 players that played that season were represented. Only "the Rev" Peter Nelson was absent and he had the best excuse of all, he was playing that day!! David and Sue Crutch and Rob and Lorna Taylor made significant effort to travel whilst we welcomed back Rob Peers and Neil Farrington after a 40-year absence. Skipper John Salvado was at his effusive best as he reminisced about the unique personalities that make up any team. A great day was had by all.

Nothing I can say touches on the enormity of Kerry "Knobby" McLeish's contribution to our club. Pleasingly, the VSDCA saw fit to recognise Knobby's 30-year contribution to the Association with deserved life membership and it was that award that provided the catalyst for another significant celebration. The warmth and admiration from the packed crowd in the room for Knobby, Vicki and family was palpable. Sal was superb again and Knobby's other favourite premiership skipper, Simon Conway, was glowing in his praise. Though a shade overwhelmed by the kudos, Knobby couldn't have been more proud.

Both events positively reinforced to us all why nothing beats being connected to a sporting club, and Malvern in particular. It gives us an identity and something to be proud of. To see so many 'more mature' Roosters on each occasion was so pleasing. We cannot ever lose sight of our celebrated history and the depth of contribution that those who have gone before us have made.

SECRETARIES' REPORT

To the Members of the Malvern Cricket Club; Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the Committee of Management I have much pleasure in submitting the 158th Annual Report of the Malvern Cricket Club covering the activities and performances of the Club, together with the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for season 2017/18.

The cricket highlight for the club was the 2nd and Gents XI teams competing in their competition's grand finals. The Gents were worthy winners while the 2nds had an honourable defeat. Congratulations to team members for their outstanding contribution to both teams during the season.

The junior club continues to thrive and provides a wonderful environment for young enthusiasts to play the game and, hopefully, retain a lifetime interest in the game. The Club provides a structured pathway program under the Malvern banner for those keen to improve their cricket skill level. The Club acknowledges the incredible contributions made by Shaun Beattie and his committee and volunteers.

We attained 6th position in the Ken Fewster VSDCA Club Championship up nine positions on the previous year. This is the key indicator of the Club's status in respect to on field performance and the improvement was most pleasing.

The 1st XI finished the season in 5th position having won 6 and lost 4 games respectively and 3 draws. We had a slow start to the season and some good victories after December 2017 that enabled us to compete in the finals. In our qualifying final, we had Oakleigh in diabolical trouble on the first day but crucial catches were missed and they made a competitive 160. These players have benefited enormously from this experience which will stand both them and the club in great stead for the future. The club is appreciative of all the efforts of David Priddle, Peter Marshall and the senior captains who have facilitated and nurtured this youth strategy.

Thanks to the junior committee members, the team managers, parents, President Shaun Beattie and Junior Club Coach Shaun Prescott who dedicate so much time and effort to ensuring our junior operation is so successful. They have run their club with efficiency given the logistic constraints imposed upon them.

David Priddle, the President of the Club, was very active managing the business of the Club and directing the management committee in administrative matters. The Committee members all contributed to the workings of the Club and are thanked for their particular effort. The Club is in good shape to enable the club prosper next season. Special mention is made of Peter Clifton who, as Club Manager, did a power of work in many areas to ensure that members enjoyed both playing and off field activities. The unassuming 'Knobby' McLeish was awarded a Life Membership of the VSDCA as a result of being a 'lifer' at Malvern. A staggering 32 years covering a wide range of roles within the Club and the VSDCA committee. We admire Knobby for his loyalty and unstinting devotion to our Club.

The season launch was held at the clubrooms on the Grand Final Public holiday after a practice game against Frankston-Peninsula CC with a strong attendance by players and supporters. The Club remains thankful for Knobby's generous contribution to the club.

Simon Walters is a major contributor to the Club. He is Treasurer, scorer for the 1st XI, JG Craig XI (and Manager) and most Gents XI matches, enters those scores into MyCricket, collates player votes, produces the player handbook and attends every club function. He is a vital cog in the Club. We applaud his efforts.

Peter Clifton, having joined the Committee this year, was the epitome of a club man. He managed our sponsor relationships, was a key driver of events including the Cinema night and liaised with the Junior Club to jointly market our club to the wider community. Adrian Preston and Peter Riddell performed the critical role of Club Umpire. There is a tremendous shortage of umpires in the association and the involvement of a quality people such as Adrian and Peter allow our 3^{rds} and 4^{ths} to play cricket at the level befitting the VSDCA competition. Thank you also to the efforts of Jim Earle and John Doig from the Victorian Sub-District Cricket Umpires Association who ensure that there are umpires available for the higher elevens.

Thank you to Simon Walters and Warren Allen who ensured we had teams entered each Friday night on MyCricket. In addition, thanks to 2nd, 3rd and 4th XI skippers for ensuring the other grade's scores were entered in on time.

David Priddle is also the historian, statistician, VSDCA delegate, keen observer of all things Malvern CC and correspondent extraordinaire. We salute him on these roles which are in addition to the Presidency of the Club.

1ST XI CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The 1st XI took on a different appearance going into this season compared to previous. With the departure of some senior players from season 2016/17, it meant that there would be opportunity for players to progress through to the 1st XI and be given a chance. We had six 1st XI debutants (Walker, Hollingworth, Vettivelu, Fielding, A. Snooks & McIntyre) and a further six players (Stevenson, Journeaux, King, Barker, Richardson & Brebner-Griffin) play who had played less than 10 1st XI matches prior to this season.

Prior to the season it was hard to place an exact expectation on our performance, however our goals were to set out to play "our game" and remain competitive. At the same time, we provided opportunity to players to gain some experience and show the coaching staff what they were capable of. Upon reflection, season 2017/18 saw those goals achieved plus some more.

The early part of the season was a challenge with the first 3 rounds consisting of 3 different formats (one-dayer, two-dayer and T20). We were also challenged with player unavailability at this time and we walked away from this phase with 2 losses and a win over eventual grand finalist Bayswater.

The next block of 3 games we identified as being crucial to our season hopes. Unfortunately, we walked away winless, with 2 rain affected draws against Brighton and Moorabbin before a disappointing loss against Endeavour Hills. From that loss however, the resilience of the group was tested and the response at training lead to our most complete performance of the season in a one-dayer vs Mount Waverley. After Liam Dunne copped an absolute jaffer first ball of the match, Randev Pathirana occupied the crease for the next 44.5 overs for a superb maiden century and an unbeaten 123. To finish the innings off and give us momentum, 24 was taken off the last over. With 206 on the board we felt confident. The bowling and fielding that followed after can only be described as disciplined and dedicated. In restricting Mount Waverley to 105, this victory gave us the belief that we were a solid team with everyone available and switched on.

This feeling was short lived as we copped a strong Oakleigh outfit in the last game before Xmas. A washout first game after Christmas vs Caulfield left us with very little wriggle room on the run home to the finals.

What transpired over the next 4 games can be described as workman like, concentrated and a committed brand of cricket. We won all 4 matches to catapult ourselves into 5th position on the ladder. We recorded victories over Noble Park, Croydon and Ormond before needing to defeat Elsternwick in a one-day game on the final day of the season. Fittingly, on the day where the club celebrated Kerry "Knobby" McLeish's fine contribution to our club and Subbies cricket, we recorded a victory to put the cherry on top of a great day. Batting first we posted a below par score of 195 which included a customary batting collapse of 7/25, which ended with the loss of 4/2. We needed someone to stand up with the ball and it was the evergreen Ben Nethersole who took charge and returned figures of 5/32. Our place in the finals was then sealed when news came through of defeats by Brighton and Box Hill. A place in the finals at Oakleigh awaited us.

Confidence was high going into this match. On the "post-Christmas" ladder we were one of 2 teams who were undefeated (with Caulfield) so we had every right to believe we were good enough. We lost the toss at Oakleigh on a hot day and got sent into the field, however a wicket with a green tinge gave us hope. We reduced them to 7/65 and 8/80....and at this stage the Roosters tails were up. From this point on however, the game changed. Aggressive batting by the Oakleigh tail and missed chances came back to haunt us as Oakleigh posted a score of 160. Even so, at this stage we thought we still had our noses in front. Liam Dunne and Luke Schumann saw us safely to stumps. Resuming Day 2 at 0/28, we knew Oakleigh would make us earn every run. We got to 0/31 and then from that point on, we were given a lesson in finals cricket and in particular disciplined bowling and catching. We were dismissed for 62 in unbelievable scenes. You give a seasoned outfit such as Oakleigh half a sniff, and they take it and run. The ball consistently found the edge of the Rooster bats and the Oakleigh fieldsman were superb in taking the opportunities. This proved to be a gut-wrenching way to finish the season.

Walking away from the season, Rooster supporters can be rest assured that our best is good enough to mix it with the top teams. We have put the structures in place to ensure there is consistency in preparation which will lead to more consistent performances. Players have had a year to experience my method of captaincy (fairly dubbed "Captain Grumpy" by Liam Dunne!!) and game day requirements.

Without signalling out individuals too much, the efforts of Liam Dunne and Luke Schumann to open the batting were gutsy and resilient at all times. Ben Nethersole leading the bowling attack only got better as the season progressed. The effort of Lachy Mason behind the stumps was not a text book style at times, however it was mighty effective. We saw personal best seasons from Randy Pathirana and Charles Journeaux to establish themselves as above average performers in Sub District cricket for season 2017-18. As for the skipper, he

thoroughly enjoyed his season and was super proud of the effort that the players showed at training and matches. The dedication and willingness to do whatever was required for the sake of the team was truly admirable. The foundations are in place for us to improve and continue to mix it with the top teams next season.

To finish, a very big thank you to those who get us onto the field each week. Peter Marshall's dedication to the playing squad is second to none. He went above and beyond the requirements of being the coach. He was ably assisted by Peter Bedford whose experience and advice to the young players was invaluable. To Simon Walters, the self-proclaimed "best scorer in the comp" we thank you for your contribution. To our team manager/curator/everything man in Knobby... all are indebted to you for your assistance and spirit of doing things the Rooster way. Finally, the support of the Committee, led by the passionate Doc Priddle, in enabling us to take the field each week and supply us with the requirements we need as a club to be able to compete and be a powerhouse of Sub District cricket is unquestionable.

I hope everyone enjoys a safe and enjoyable break. Season 2018/19 will see pre-season done slightly different to get ourselves above the pack and ready to contest the season from ball 1. If we prepare the same as we did for season 2017/18, we will likely get overtaken or at best, produce the same results. We want to get the Roosters back to where they belong and that is the top of the pile come season end.

2ND XI CAPTAIN'S REPORT

It's worth looking at recent seasons for the seconds to gain some context for this year. Last season, we finished 10th. Previous to that we had finished 2nd (15/16) and 3rd (14/15) winning a Grand Final and losing one. The 13/14 season saw us in 8th and the two prior to that (12/13 and 11/12) saw us 4th in both and again winning one Grand Final and losing the other.

So, we'd seen the 2nds play 4 Grand Finals in 5 years before last season (and 8 in 13 years) and had perhaps become accustomed to such success. The aim of the 17/18 season was to get the team competitive again, return us to those winning ways and prepare a new crop of youngsters for future 1st XI cricket.

Unfortunately, we had an enormous number of unavailabilities for a variety of reasons and this made selection highly problematic. We played 29 different players (28 last season, 21 before that) and started the year with 7 players missing from last season - Gav Thompson, 'Flash' Gordon, Jimmy Lynch, George Hiotis, Dan Black, Sam Patterson with Adam Hollingworth moving up to the 1sts.

The 2nd XI team selection changed constantly with 5 changes for round 2, then 3, 2, 3, 5, 2, 3, 4, 2, 3, 3, 1, 2, and 3 changes – the Grand Final was the only game we played with an unchanged team! Despite this, and a significant lack of 2nd XI experience, our season was a real triumph.

In compiling this report, it seemed a good idea to collate the excellent weekly reports by Doc Priddle as the basis to explain how the season unfolded.

Rd 1 vs Balwyn at Balwyn (1 dayer)

We won the toss and batted first at a very sandy Gordon Barnard Reserve. Alex Brebner-Griffin (30), Rob Templeton (30) and Jeff Davies (24) all made contributions, but the big innings needed to bat through all our overs never came. Even so, 8/164 off 45 was a respectable total, and one we thought we could defend on a big ground and slow outfield, but it proved to be a few short.

Dan Fielding (1/15 off 7) and Sam King (1/25 off 8) kept things tight along with the skipper (1/29 off 9) but wickets didn't come regularly enough. Balwyn claimed the points with 16 sixteen balls to spare and five wickets in hand. The early bowling was wayward and lacked consistency plus we dropped a few catches but otherwise, it was a promising start.

Rd 2 vs Bayswater at Malvern

Our first game at home was going to be most interesting with the new rules requiring the boundary to be nearly 3 metres shorter and the outfield lightning quick at this early stage of the season. We lost the toss although it probably proved a good one to lose as overcast skies and a wicket with a greenish tinge at Malvern favoured the bowlers. Dan Fielding (3/46 off 17) was excellent up front as we got ahead of the game with Baysy at 3/31. Inconsistent change bowling in the face of aggressive batting meant we went at four an over for the next 25 overs but after a 90 run 4th wicket partnership we steadily got back in to the game.

The innings was evenly poised at tea at 7/180 and a final score of 226 was a good comeback by our bowlers. John Cowell (2/23 off 4.5), Steuart Snooks (2/40 off 10) and Ben Herath (2/44 off 13) all bowled well whilst evergreen Warren Allen (1/28 off 8), bowling in sunglasses and a cap, stemmed the flow of runs at a critical time.

From the remaining 19 overs of the day we raced to 1/72, with Fieldo (36 not out) completing a fine all-round day whilst Manny Bola (26 not out), promoted after a century in the 3rds' previous game, showed he is an exciting prospect with some classy shot-making.

Sadly, we were disappointing on day two and were deservedly beaten. Overnight batsman Dan Fielding (49) and Maninder Bola (40) couldn't replicate their first day fireworks and when they both fell with the score on 104, along with Rory Drummond, we had plenty to do. Batting at five Andrew Snooks (59) fought valiantly and was the last man dismissed but he received little support.

Batting at ten, Warren Allen wound back the clock again and threatened to take us to an unlikely victory putting on 40 with Snooksy but it wasn't to be, and the six points were lost. With 35 overs still available things got worse as Baysy made a rapid fire 1/132 to cap off a bad day.

Rd 3 vs Box Hill at Box Hill (T20)

Winning the toss and bowling we put in a disciplined performance with the ball, with early wickets seeing Box Hill at 3/26. All the bowlers put in a good shift with Zac Richardson (2/21 off 4) claiming the best figures. We restricted Box Hill to a manageable 4/106, bowling just one wide.

Openers Harry Gell and Manny Bola got us off to a good start putting on 44 and keeping up with the rate. On debut in the 2nds Nikhil Badkundri (35 not out) was excellent and Rob Templeton chipped in with an important knock as we won three down with two overs to spare, giving us first points for the year. At this point we were 10th on the ladder.

Rd 4 vs Brighton at Malvern

We lost the toss at Malvern and were asked to field. Zac Richardson (5/42 off 16) was excellent early taking five of the first six wickets to see us well in front at 6/85 and then 6/139 at tea. Credit to the opposition, it's lower order batted well to get back into the game. As the Malvern deck turned in to its usual post-tea road we struggled to rein them in. A final score of 240 off 77.2 overs saw us face a few nervous overs before stumps, fortunately without loss.

Sadly, torrential rain across Melbourne on day 2 beat us when we were in a winning position. Despite plenty of rain during the week, conditions were good and Rohan Thukral (91*) opened the batting and batted diligently for 71 overs. Rob Templeton (30) and Andrew Snooks (22) got starts but at 6/149 we were in trouble. First-year Rooster Darren Smith (33*) then put on an unbeaten 60 with Rohan for the seventh wicket and we had the momentum at 6/209 chasing 240 when the final rain came, with 7 overs remaining. With 5 of the other 6 games ending with a result, we slipped back another position on the ladder to 11th.

Rd 5 vs Moorabbin at Moorabbin

Knowing we were now playing the 2 bottom teams in 2 day games, we were keeping an eye out for a possible outright win to get back up the table. Losing the toss actually helped this cause, despite the fine conditions, and when we had the opposition 9/86 soon after tea, we had thoughts of claiming the first 6 points on day 1. However, a 39 run last wicket partnership let them kick away to make 125 and, more importantly, use up quite a few overs..

Dan Fielding (5/20 off 11.2) claimed the figures whilst the skipper (3/43 off 15) put in a solid shift. 15 year old youngster Seb Anderson (1/25 off 5) picked up a wicket on debut as well. With 34 overs to bat we were hopeful of a solid start but finished at 3/52 from just 14 overs with 19 or so overs lost to the threat of lightning. Those lost overs, combined with 7 dropped catches, saw us miss out on getting the win and with the whole round washed out next week, our chance to regain 3 points on the teams above was lost.

Rd 6 vs Endeavour Hills at Endeavour Hills

Aiming even more strongly to chase an outright win, we ventured out to Endeavour Hills in a mini-bus hired from the Stonnington council for this Saturday/Sunday game. Heavy rain late in the week caused one end of the wicket to be damp and, despite the sunny day, the umpire called off the day's play by 12:15pm. This resigned us to playing a one-dayer the next day and no chance of going for the outright we so very much needed. It should be noted that every other game played that day (and Moorabbin lost outright!).

On day 2 we won the toss and lost Brebs to the second ball of the game. Another wicket soon after had us struggling at 2/7 but a 72 run partnership between Dan (50) and Rohan (14) got us to 79 before they both departed and Alex Ross (playing his first game of the season due to injury) played a sparkling innings of 44 to get us to 7/155. Sam King (29*) and Darryn Smith (27*) hit well at the finish to see us to an imposing 7/216 off our 45 overs.

With the ball, we got 2 early wickets to have them 2/17 and then they settled into a partnership of 55 before a stunning run out by Smithy who hit the stumps direct with a throw from the deep mid-on boundary as the batsmen attempted a 3rd run. This dramatically changed the game and we never let them get away from us, taking the last 8 wickets for 85 to bowl them out with 15 balls to spare. Back after VCE exams, Hamish McIntyre (2/31 off 9) was good up front along with Rossy (1/27 off 8) and then Snooksie (4/17 off 9) put the finishing touches to an excellent display as we dismissed Endeavour for 157. We moved up to seventh with this win, three points out of the top six.

Rd 7 vs Mt Waverley at Malvern (1 dayer)

In superb conditions at Malvern, we bowled after winning the toss and started in a blaze of glory with 15 y.o. youngster Seb Anderson (2/10 off 5) opening the bowling and claiming two scalps and Liam Barker (1/31 off 9) one as we reduced the opposition to 3/13 in the first five overs. Hamish McIntyre (2/15 off 6) looked good again providing great support, along with Sam King (2/31 off 9) and Dan Fielding (2/31 off 6.1), as we restricted

Mount to 8/67 before their #9 bat used a good eye and some lusty hitting to lift them to a very gettable 149 off 41.1 overs. Keeper Rob Templeton rounded out a great effort in the field with 5 catches.

Fieldo had been threatening a big knock for some time and it duly came as he exploded, hitting 16-4's and 3-6's in a match-winning knock of 113*. Fieldo put on 60 with Nikhil Badkundri (21) for the second wicket and then an undefeated 81 for the third wicket, with Jeff Davies contributing just five, as the powerful Kiwi rugby player went berserk. We were victorious by eight wickets and eighteen overs to spare in a powerful display.

With two solid wins in a row, we were starting to feel some momentum (at last) but the real test would be next 2 rounds against Oakleigh and Caulfield

Rd 8 vs Oakleigh at Oakleigh (1 dayer)

In the last game before Christmas, we faced ladder leaders Oakleigh, who had finished top of ladder in 3 of the past 4 seasons (the other year they were 2nd) and played in 4 consecutive Grand Finals, winning 3 of them (losing the other one to us in 2014/15). Over the past 4 years they had lost only 7 of the past 70 games played and were undefeated so far this season, making this a real test of how we were travelling.

Losing the toss, we bowled first with Liam Barker (2/30 off 9) and the skipper, Steuart Snooks (2/23 off 9) combining to reduce the home side to 5/56. We kept things under control from there and restricted the ladder leaders to 7/157 off 45 with an excellent effort. Hamish McIntyre also impressed with the ball and Adam Hollingworth, down for first for the only time for the season, picked up their best batsmen nice and cheaply (albeit it with a long hop!).

In reply, 'keeper Rob Templeton (47) gave the top order some momentum but at 5/99 the match was in the balance. A 58 run sixth wicket partnership between Hairy Hollingworth (34) and Sam King (20) saw the match turn in our favour. Despite them both getting out in consecutive balls with 1 run to win, our excellent chase saw us get over the line seven down with fourteen balls to spare.

Rd 9 vs Caulfield at Malvern (1 dayer)

In the first game of the New Year we faced Caulfield who finished 2nd on ladder last season and were level on points with us so far this season. We lost toss and bowled and in consistently drizzly conditions we found it hard to control the ball and with them batting with real intent we were glad to be called off for rain with them at 3/177 from just 32 overs. Hamish McIntyre, Rohan Thukral and the skipper picked up a wicket each but there was no denying we would have been chasing a sizeable total. The rain continued, washing out our and all other games.

Rd 10 vs Noble Park at Noble Park

Still keen to chase an outright, and playing the 3rd bottom team, we were not unhappy to lose the toss, despite the excellent conditions at Noble Park. Having returned to cricket after VCE studies, young seamers Finn Healy (4/23 off 11) in his second 2nd XI game and Hamish McIntyre (2/33 off 8) helped reduce Noble to 7/60 before they recovered with a 57 run partnership. Bu then Tim Arbon (4/23 off 11), making a welcome return to the field, maintained the pressure and a final score of all out 133 off 43.2 was a great effort by our bowlers

Noble had a 1st XI player who could only play Day 1 and he opened the bowling with fast off-spin to run through our top order claiming 4/21 from 18 overs unchanged from the northern end. We were 5/35 and then 6/51 approaching stumps before recovering to 6/68 with Rohan Thukral (15*) and Arbs (13*) at the close of play.

In fine conditions on day 2, chasing 133, we were going to have to battle hard just to get the 6 points, let alone any thoughts of an outright. But Arbs counter-attacked in his inimitable fashion and despite losing Rohan for an invaluable 28 (and being dropped to a skier that would have easily been taken if the fielders had not collided), he showed again just how dangerous he can be with the bat. monstering a few hits over mid-wicket and taking us to within 30 odd of the winning score. A sensible 31 from Finn Healy (including a 61 run 8th wicket partnership with Tim) and a useful 15 from Liam saw us finish up on 192, a lead of 59.

With 50 odd overs still left in the day, we bowled again and this time ran through all but their #3, who was only one to make double figures and last dismissed for 31. Darren Smith (4/9 off 4) finally showed the scary potential we been seeing at training to run through the middle order with brute pace as we bundled them out for just 65 in 24.5 overs. Dan Fielding pocketed 4 catches in the slips and then went out to knock off 7 runs for the outright victory, something that had looked quite unlikely at the start of the day.

Rd 11 vs Croydon at Malvern

At Malvern, we lost another toss and bowled on a "Knobby road." We were on top early as we maintained a consistent line and length to have them 3/57. Poor fielding cost us as we missed the opposition centurion on

multiple occasions. Fortunately, he gave his wicket away immediately upon reaching the ton and a good last hour saw Croydon restricted to a manageable 8/259. Medium pacers Finn Healy (2/40 off 14) and Liam Barker (2/42 off 15) were good on a very flat deck whilst Rohan Thukral (2/32off 8) bowled well at the death.

Next week, in similar conditions, our openers thrived to put on 146 for the first wicket. The two lefties Alex Brebner-Griffin (46) and Dan Fielding scored freely and set up things beautifully for debutant Tim Finnemore (33) to come in at #3. Tim started carefully and then found his confidence as Dan pounded the bowling at the other end before holing out for a magnificent 155 (12 fours and an amazing 9 sixes). We reaching 260 in just 60 overs and batted on with aim of a score of 300 and to give another debutant Tom Walker (46) some time in the middle, only declaring when Tom was dismissed at 8/322 from 74 overs - a comprehensive win.

Rd 12 vs Ormond at Ormond

Losing another toss, we worked hard in excellent batting conditions at EE Gunn Reserve. We held them to 4/72 off 43 at tea and when we picked up the seventh wicket at 110 we were hoping for a quick end to the innings. The Ormond lower order batted sensibly, seeing out their 80, for a final score of 9/179. Youngster Finn Healy (3/21 off 13) was excellent again whilst fellow seamers Hamish McIntyre (1/27 off 13), Liam Barker (1/14 off 9) and Rohan Thukral (1/22 off 9) kept the pressure on throughout. Snooksie (2/39 off 22) bowled expertly in to a strong breeze and the energy was excellent as befitting a team full of confidence and looking for a strong finals campaign.

Our recent batting gave us confidence we could achieve that and despite another wicket lost in the first over and 2 others that saw us at 3/34 we then took control. Wicket keeper Rob Templeton then hit his maiden century for the club (114 with 15-4's and 1-6) to wrest back control. Rob has been excellent all year playing a number of crucial knocks in the top order and his keeping has been first class. With cloudy weather looking a threat and under instruction to ensure we achieved the runs by tea, Smithy (37) hit out with a number of 4s and 6s to see us reach the win at 4/180 by tea, after which Robbie reached his ton, a well-deserved reward for a lot of hard work.

Aiming at another score of 300, and giving our lower order bats a hit in preparation for upcoming finals, the skipper (33) and Zac Richardson (30, his highest score for the club) pressed on to finish all out at 303 off 72.4 overs and moved to second on the ladder three points behind Oakleigh.

Rd 13 vs Elsternwick at Malvern

We played this way game at Malvern on Sunday due to the unavailability of the Wicks home ground all season. In excellent conditions, Elsty batted well to recover from 6/113 to make 7/182 from their 45 overs. Finn Healy (3/35 off 9) was the pick of the bowlers whilst Dan Fielding (2/29 off 8.3) and the skipper (1/26 off 9) were tidy.

In reply, opener Alex Brebner-Griffin (67*) found some good from at the right time and guided us without any real alarm to a comfortable six wicket victory with 10 overs to spare. Darren Smith (36* with 4-4's and 3-6's) provided some late fireworks and Rob Templeton (21) also contributed.

So, we finished the season in second place and undefeated since round two, qualifying for a home final against fifth-placed Box Hill.

Qualifying Final vs Box Hill at Malvern

As a result of a string of lost tosses, we had learned to win games batting second and win them well. So when the skipper won the toss, much as I would have preferred to continue our pattern of bowling first, I reluctantly decided to bat, knowing our top order would be distraught at missing a chance to finally bat first in good conditions!

As I feared, we made rather a mess of things, losing wickets at regular intervals to be bowled out for 160 in 73 overs. Only Brebs (36) of the top order showed the requisite amount of patience required in finals cricket. The skipper (30) followed suit, shepherding the lower order including 15 y.o. Josh Nelson, who came in at #11 to play his first innings at 2nd XI, play fearlessly and hit everything in the middle and finish not out as we made only 160.

Critically, this allowed Box Hill to bat on Day 1 and while we were delighted to get a wicket first ball, they scored 15 runs. This meant they only needed 145 off 80 overs whereas if we had held out till stumps and used our full allotment of overs, we could have made another 15-20 runs. This would have meant Box Hill needed 175-180 (ie; 30 runs more) and that makes a huge difference in the pressure of final cricket.

The following day we picked up another wicket but then Box Hill settled into their batting on a flat track and, while we kept the scoring rate under control, they edge the score up to 2/115 and with 45 runs needed and 8

wickets in hand, our backs were against the wall. We then saw a remarkable period of cricket as we took 4 for 1 and then another 2 for none thanks to a heroic spell of bowling by Darryn Smith (4/24) and a spectacular direct hit run out of the opposing captain by Andrew Snooks.

Smithy bowled a long 12 over spell with a side strain and was clearly in considerable pain but, on a flat track, and with his extra speed, we just had to keep him on. At 8/125 chasing 160 the odds were in our favour. But with the batsmen having plenty of overs and a good deal of experience, they settled and while the scoring rate dried up we couldn't break through and they edged across the line in a gripping finish. It was a truly great, tense finals atmosphere with a large number of the Malvern faithful on the boundary willing us to a victory.

Fortunately our loss didn't spell the end of our finals campaign. As the highest placed losing team, we went through to the semi-finals but would be the lowest ranked team and this would come back to bite us in the Grand Final. Our semi was against the ladder leaders Oakleigh but because of the 1sts finals fixtures, the game would be played at Malvern.

Semi-Final vs Oakleigh at Malvern

In superb conditions at Malvern on a Knobby special we lost the toss and Oakleigh batted, which suited us nicely.

Keen as ever to get involved in the game, Smith asked to field at point or covers but the skipper reminded him that many batsmen tried to sneak a single wide of mid-on and a lively fieldsman there can often pick up a run out (aka Warren Allen of years gone by). Sure enough, it took just a few balls into the first over for exactly that to happen and Smith run out their opener trying for an optimistic single to get us off to a flying start.

Hamish nicked off the other opener and at 2/8 we were delighted with our start. A 50 partnership held us up until Liam Barker (4/33 off 12) came into the attack. After missing the previous game with injury, Barks got right into his work and picked up 3 of the middle order bats to outside edges to have them 5/85. The main obstacle was now their #5 who had dropped down from Oakleigh's firsts for this game but, as he so often did during the year, Rohan (2/21 off 9) chipped in to claim his wicket (plus another soon afterwards) and we were back in control. At 9/127 their skipper tried to occupy the crease and, despite the skippers pleas to bowl at the stumps, our bowlers used a line outside off, allowing runs to be eked out with little risk and the score mounted to 160. Barks came back on, bowled straight at the stumps and immediately terminated the innings.

Despite Oakleigh scoring 30 more than we'd have liked, we were comfortable starting our chase, although we knew that Oakleigh contained some fine 2nd XI bowlers assisted by the weather closing in making light an issue. Our unofficial team manager Peter Bedford ensured that we were highly focused on the job at hand with a memorable and rousing 'pep talk' prior to us going out to bat – the guys were gobsmacked to witness one of the great motivational 'rev ups', reminiscent of Pete's old footy days. As we'll see, the impact of this clearly showed in our batting.

Brebs started confidently with two boundaries but when we lost two wickets in two balls with the score on 19 we looked a bit shaky. Coming in on a hat-trick Jeff Davies survived and knuckled down in a fine display of patient batting. He worked perfectly with Fieldo who was in his usual explosive form and we prospered finishing the day on 2/72 with Fieldo on 56*.

Batting conditions on day two were a carbon copy of the first day although it was a lot more windy. Fieldo offered a chance early which wasn't taken, and it was onwards and upwards from there. He batted superbly making 116 (15-4's and 3-6's) to calm any Rooster nerves and replaced Nick Gill (133) as our most recent 2nd XI finals centurion (Nick's effort two seasons ago was also against Oakleigh). Jeff (9* off 143) complemented his partner magnificently in a partnership of 135 and we only needed seven when Fieldo was out.

A seven-wicket win with 27 overs to spare against the top ranked opposition was a fantastic effort. No-one can say we didn't deserve as we beat Oakleigh in the home and away round as well.

Grand Final vs Bayswater at Malvern

Not the result we wanted in our 2nd XI Grand Final as we were soundly beaten by a far superior Bayswater team. Congratulations to our opponent who claimed three premierships - the 2nd, 3rd and 4th elevens.

It was a pity we didn't bring our 'A' game but it must be remembered we went in with a very inexperienced side at this level. Save for Snooksie, only Sam King and Jeff Davies had played more than 20 games at 2nd XI level so there is a lot to be enthused about. Finals experience is at a premium and some of our talented youngsters have been exposed to it now and will be better for the run.

After so much rain on Saturday, conditions at Bayswater were simply superb and confirmed its status as clearly the best playing surface in Subbies. We lost the toss and were asked to bat. Dan Fielding (31 off 45) was the only one of the top order to get going as we lost wickets at regular intervals in the face of a strong and varied attack.

Jeff (25* off 58) battled hard to shepherd the lower order to a defendable total but 108 was nowhere near enough. of their openers, a 16 year old, two years out of Craig Shield representative cricket, put our batting in perspective as he made things look easy and, with ex-Rooster Shane "Flash" Gordon, put on 95 to snuff out any hope. We never stopped trying, claiming two wickets before they passed us but in truth it was small consolation.

Wrap up

Much as we regret losing the final, we had already exceeded any expectations we might have had at the start of the season. What the team learnt from the season overall, and the finals in particular (the guys got to play 3 finals games), can only stand us in good stead for the future.

While we had many excellent contributors during the season, our X factor was clearly Dan Fielding. On top of his club awards, he also won the prestigious James Earle Award for the best player in the 2nd XI (3-2-1 voting by umpires). Fieldo enjoyed a stellar season, making 618 at 61.8 (including 3 centuries) and taking 16 wickets – a fact not lost on the crowd at the annual RM Hatch Presentation, when an audible gasp was heard when his figures were shown on the big screen. Fieldo joins Warren Allen (2012/13) and Peter 'Dingley' Clark (1980/81) as past 2nd XI Rooster winners.

Fieldo's efforts (not just his performances) allowed younger players to grow and thrive in circumstances that would have been considerably more difficult without the runs, wickets and steady hands he provided. He was also a willing worker off the field, helping with setting up training nets, covers or anything else needed. It's no coincidence that he was one of the first at training week in, week out - a fine contributor to the club.

I am absolutely delighted at the progress made this season by our young bowlers Hamish McIntyre, Finn Healy and Zach Richardson as well as the more experienced Liam Barker and Sam King. Darryn Smith provided the X factor with the ball when his body was up to it and our 15 year-olds Seb Anderson and Josh Nelson distinguished themselves in their brief appearances.

Our keeper Robbie Templeton settled nicely into the team as the year progressed, making 350 runs (including a century) and looking more and more accomplished with the gloves with every game.

Our batting is the area that offers greatest opportunity for improvement and Brebs, Jeffa, Andrew Snooks and Rohan all showed they are worthy at this level and ready to go the next level in their performances next season.

I must conclude by highlighting a guy who was a real 'team' man this season. Having only ever played one 2nd XI game before this season, he came into the team and never looked like leaving it. He batted everywhere in the top 6 according to the team's needs, was happy to do so and almost never let us down. He was a very, very handy change bowler who was never mastered by any batsman and his efforts in the field could not be faulted (except maybe once against Elsternwick at third man when he reached for the ball like is was one of the many cans of Furphys he'd enjoyed the night before). And all this with a dodgy knee. Rohan became an indispensable member of the team and, to my mind, one of the first picked as a team member who could be relied upon to always give his best.

Thanks to all the guys who played in the team during the season – despite all the changes, we always had great morale and a strong sense of the great Malvern spirit was always evident.

My thanks to Doc and the committee for entrusting me with the role as 2nd XI captain, especially given my age (well into my 50s) and some 17 years since I last played at 2nd XI level.

Thanks to the indefatigable Pete Marshall who, not only organised and drove us all to higher efforts at training, but also doubled up as chairman of selectors and overcome the formidable and often short notice challenges it presented.

Thanks so much to Peter Bedford who came to take on the role of running our pre-game warm ups and driving us to an intensity that I'm convinced got us starting each day at a more focused level than would otherwise have occurred.

Thanks also to my old mate Peter Clifton who, in addition to his role on committee, stepped in as a sort of ground manager for our home games. There is a surprising number of chores to get set up for home games and I could always rely on Pete to fill the gaps, especially when it came to making sure drinks and afternoon tea were under control. Pete's efforts to uphold the Malvern reputation for top notch afternoon teas were much appreciated by all - our guys, the opposition, the umpires and our loyal spectators.

And thanks to Warren Allen who stepped in to help on the field and as scorer as needed. I'm sure his efforts and experience early in season helped to set us off in the right direction and yielded fruit at finals time.

So that's it, a great season to be involved at Malvern, with rich promise for coming years.

3RD XI CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The Third XI started their 2017/18 season in terrific fashion, posting a mammoth one-day score of 8-277 against Balwyn in their very first outing. In his first knock for the club, Maninder Bola (100) posted the side's only century for the season and was ably supported by Rohan Thukral and Nikhil Badkundri. A 71-run victory on the first day of the new season had hopes high, but it turned out to be ball, not bat, which guided the Rooster's success throughout the year.

Any confidence gained in round one was quickly dashed by successive defeats at the hands of Bayswater, Box Hill and Brighton. Whilst glimmers of brilliance from Darryn Smith (55 vs Bayswater), Gavin Thompson (55 vs Box Hill) and skipper Will Kiernan (4-23 vs Brighton) provided silver linings throughout, easy dismissals and dropped catches (often in heartbreaking circumstances) saw the Thirds slump to the lower half of the ladder early in the season. Any cause for positivity was further dampened (rather literally) as Malvern sacrificed two full day's cricket to the weather against bottom placed Moorabbin in round five.

However, round six brought with it both new players and renewed form for established ones. Luke Mardsen (3-17) and Bandara Herath (4-17) tore through Endeavour Hills in their first respective contributions to the Third XI cause, restricting the visitors to just 86 in a 65-run victory. A repeat performance against a competitive Mount Waverley left the opposition 78 short in their chase of Malvern's 9-167, this time John Cowell (3-16) assisting Luke (3-26) in putting on a dominant display.

The highlight of the season took place in round eight, as Malvern took on an undefeated Oakleigh at TH King. Luke Marsden (3-12) once again turned tormentor, as he and Finn Healy (3-9) restricted the premiers to just 84 in their allotted overs. Whilst a nerve-racking fall of Malvern wickets saw the game poised on a knife's edge at 6-61, the steady hands of Sagar Sareen and Seb Anderson saw us home, handing Oakleigh their first defeat since February 2016. The victory not only proved to us that we could compete with and defeat the best sides in the competition, but also saw us break into the top six going into Christmas.

Malvern's undefeated run continued after the break, first with a rather unsatisfactory washout against archrivals Caulfield and then with a dominant win against fifth placed Noble Park. Tom Walker (91) and Will Kiernan (6-13 for the match) lead the way in perhaps the most one-sided performance of the year, taking home 10 points with an outright victory by and innings and 73 runs. The win saw the Thirds placed fifth at the end of round 10 with a six-game undefeated streak and a seemingly easy road to a finals berth.

However, a much-improved Croydon outfit took the fight to Malvern in what turned out to be one of the most competitive matches of the year. Despite a three and half hour innings by Jeff Davies (71), in what should have been a match winning knock, inaccurate bowling and further dropped chances saw Croydon steal victory from the jaws of the defeat, hitting the winning runs with just five balls and one wicket to spare.

The final two rounds of the home and away season saw the resumption of form for many players, as we dominated Ormond with both bat (Nikhil with 56) and ball (Will with 4-9) in a match that was almost over before it started; Ormond crumbling to 4-2 by the fifth over of the first day. Despite being denied the outright win due to unsatisfactory conditions on the second day against Ormond, the Thirds consolidated their position on the ladder with a comfortable defeat of Elsternwick the following week. Seb Anderson (2-17) broke a couple of vital partnerships during the first innings, and Rory Drummond (26*) consolidated a precarious position to see us pass the home side's score of 147 with five wickets in hand.

Finishing fifth is always a difficult prospect, particularly when the reigning premiers await you in round one of the finals. Whilst the fortune of being afforded a home final gave Malvern cause for optimism,

this quickly gave way to realism as Oakleigh's opening bowlers tore through our top and middle orders, leaving us 7-60 going into the tea break. A lower order fightback saw us post a defendable 127, and wickets to John and Luke respectively ended the first day with the visitors poised delicately at 2-25. An early wicket on the second day buoyed our spirits even more, however the total set by Malvern proved too low to adequately defend, despite Bandara's attempts to replicate last year's semi-final feat.

In many ways the qualifying final reflected the Third XI's year as a whole: domination with either bat or ball, but seemingly never in the same match. However, the match also reflected our season in its spirit and nature – we played aggressive cricket, but in good spirit, humour and manner. We greatly enjoyed each other's company as well as that of our opponents. With many fresh faces becoming established, vital players by the season's end, it is exciting to think what can be achieved with that spirit and camaraderie in season 2018/19.

I would like to thank every player with whom I took to the field this season, as well as their friends and family members – you have all have made the Third XI a great environment for our established players to perform and our younger ones to grow.

4TH XI CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The 2017/18 season opener against Balwyn started with a completely new look team compared to the team that had played off in the previous season's Grand Final with only three players from the Grand Final lining up for the opening game.

The first two games resulted in convincing losses to Final 6 sides however in both instances each of their scores were dominated by a player who subsequently played in higher grades. He is now the second highest run scorer for the Club and many victories were due to him getting quick early runs. Saurabh Patel, Karan Patel and myself were the other batsmen in the middle order and all showed their ability to make scores. Unfortunately, Sam Patel sustained a season ending knee injury against Brighton which was a big loss to our middle order. We wish him well in his recovery. Despite the disappointment of not making the finals the highlight was no doubt the debuts by many of our junior players who not only brought a new level of enthusiasm, but once selected, also trained with the senior teams which then served as a bridge between the senior and junior clubs. Hopefully these players will be given opportunities in higher levels in years ahead. In the instances of Joshua Nelson, Seb Anderson, Luke Marsden, Alec Elkington this has already occurred. In the 30 years that I have been involved in the Club I have not seen such a promising number of younger players. The other junior players to play were Sam and Duncan Gardiner, Alex Feola, Thomas and Edward Nelson, Hamish Francis, Harry and Jock Carter, Angus Edgar, Tyler Stewart, Joe Laurie, Zach Simonsz and Scott Beilby. All of these players have all round capabilities and were happy to bat up the order, open the bowling and, in the case of Angus and Duncan, wicket keep. The other junior player was Jay Thorn who bowled with genuine pace however elected to finish the season at Glen Alvie.

Thanks go to Peter Marshall who was instrumental in approaching the juniors for games and, as Chairman of Selectors, ensured that we went into each game with a full team even when there were withdrawals on the Saturday morning. Also thanks to "Marshy" and "Wheels" for their coaching expertise and ensuring training was both varied and well structured.

Thanks also to parents such as Kym and Paul Gardiner, Tim Nelson and life members Dixie and JR and others who assisted with scoring, drinks and the tea break. Their help was invaluable and much appreciated.

Finally, thanks to David Priddle and the committee to ensuring the Club ran smoothly and enabled 48 players to represent the Club in the fourths and in particular Knobby for his guidance regarding covers and his liaison with the City of Stonnington regarding curation. GENT'S XI CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Off the back of their most challenging season, Malvern's Gents' XI found the success they had craved for many a year. A premiership in 2017-18, their second in the MCA, was just reward after several fruitless finals appearances in recent years.

A productive off-season set the platform for the Gents' renewed success. With Endeavour Hills discontinuing their MCA team, the Gents' XI became the new home for certain individuals thanks to a strong relationship forged over three years of competition. The arrivals brought years of experience to the squad which, in particular, proved critical in the latter part of the season.

Results over the first half of the season see-sawed as the side gradually found its balance, and though placed just outside the top four at Christmas, there had been glimpses of what was to come. It took until the end of January for the team to really hit its straps, but with a settled lineup the Gents strung together several commanding victories to finish the regular season in third position.

Having assumed hosting duties in the semi-final against Maccabi Ajax, the Gents batted first and made the most of the favourable conditions. Led by Manni Bola's 65, the team registered an imposing total of 4/188. A complete performance with the ball saw six bowlers take a wicket, accompanied by a superb effort in the field. Maccabi were never in the hunt and fell for just 115.

Other club results on that weekend allowed the team to welcome back Charlie Journeaux and Ben Herath. What an impact these two would have on the grand final.

Taking to the expansive surrounds of Cordner Oval, the Gents faced the Melbourne Cobras. Having lost the previous two A-Sunday grand finals, the Cobras were eager to record their first MCA premiership. A rain-delayed toss was won by captain Andy Selleck, who made the strong call to bat first. Continuing their form from the semi-final, openers Bola & Andrew Journeaux made an excellent start, with their partnership totalling 84. Andrew would go on to post a measured half-century, and at 1/124 the Gents were sitting pretty. However, a calamitous collapse of 9/50 was certainly not in the playbook. Nevertheless, while short of the intended target, 175 would be a tough chase given the setting.

Jeff Park's dismissal of the Cobras' captain off the first ball of their innings sparked a dream start for the Gents, and when Ben Herath dismissed the grade's leading run-scorer for a duck, the Cobras were well in arrears at 5/54. However, as if expected, the Cobras' famed middle-order found momentum and with 69 required off the last 11 overs, it was anyone's game.

Enter Charlie Journeaux.

With one of the best spells in Gents' history, Charlie tore through the Cobras' lower order. He extracted just enough movement from the pitch, evidenced by the fact his four wickets were all bowled, the last of which clinched the premiership. In the end, a 49-run victory delivered a flag in the MCA's premier one-day competition.

Andrew Journeaux had a superb season atop the batting order. His 245 runs came at a quick rate and, notably, he saved his best performance for the grand final, top-scoring with 53 and being adjudged man of the match. We congratulate him on his marriage to Tracey during the season.

Andrew's opening partner, Manni Bola, was the X-factor in the side. A scintillating batsman, his aggression and consistency was critical, while his left arm orthodox spin was more than handy. With a combined 113 runs, 2 wickets, 2 runouts and a catch, Manni was the side's best performer in the finals series.

Charlie Journeaux, put simply, is a joy to play with. The side delighted in Charlie's performances in the 1st XI, and despite shouldering a heavy workload, he would front up time and again on a Sunday to play his part. His starring role in the grand final capped off a magnificent season with the ball, and if he can rediscover his touch with the bat, Howland Trophy honours await.

Blaize Bainbridge joined the side from Endeavour Hills and, despite having a lean season with the bat, was able to find form at the business end of the season. His unbeaten half-century in the final game of the regular season, in which no other batsman made more than 20, showed his potential, and he carried this form into the semi-final. In addition, Blaize is a stunning fieldsman. He made the cover position his own, rarely allowing a ball to pass.

Arriving at the club as a reigning MCA best & fairest winner, Henry Vettivelu proved his reputation as one of the premier all-rounders in the competition. He combined four half-centuries with 16 wickets, and it was

no surprise that he won the Gents' MVP award by a considerable margin. Comfortably the recruit of the season, we can't wait for another big year from Henry.

Andy Selleck, in his second season as captain, displayed the full extent of his tactical nous. As always, he was cool under pressure and led the side flawlessly across both finals. The history of cricket is littered with captains who've struggled to bowl themselves adequately, but Andy's 14 wickets at less than 17 quashed any such suggestions. Unsurprisingly, he had another excellent year in the field.

Jeff Park's importance to the side cannot be overstated. More than just the leader of the bowling attack, Jeff is the heartbeat of the team. After a flawless start to the season, Jeff was struck down with injury post-Christmas. He returned in the last round of the season, after a 3-month layoff, to register the outrageous figures of 4 overs, 4 maidens, 1/0. Few, if any, have done better.

Together with Jeff, Nick Journeaux formed the competition's most effective opening bowling combination. He was deservedly the team's highest wicket-taker, deceiving many a batsman with his outswing. Furthermore, Nick's fielding was impeccable as always, epitomised by his stunning direct-hit runout from the boundary in the semi-final.

Medium-pacer Mathew Park had a fine season with the ball, highlighted by a 5-wicket haul against Clayton. He was unlucky not to win the bowling award, continuing his knack for dismissing the opposition's highest scorer. Furthermore, he was as assured as ever in the field, and his blinder at gully in the semi-final will live on in the memory banks.

Ben Herath was the team's front-line spinner, a position he held with relish, and turned in an excellent season. Though forever seeking a promotion in the batting order, he bowled with patience and guile, regularly proving difficult to get away. In what was his most rounded performance of the season, he made valuable runs in the grand final before taking two vital wickets.

If the strength of a side can be measured by those who are left out, it is no wonder a premiership ensued with Manny Coomaraswamy as 12th man. Joining us from Endeavour Hills, he had an impact in every game he played with his undeniable all-round talent. A quiet though supremely intelligent cricketer, he will be a key plank in the team's premiership defence next season.

Midway through the season, club stalwart Stephen Knowles informed the team that this year would be his last on the cricket field. He farewelled the game in the most perfect manner - a wicket with his very last delivery. Retiring with a mammoth 340 games to his name, the 'Toucan' deserves special congratulations from all at Malvern.

In what has been a joy to see at close range, Sam Gardiner's game has grown from strength to strength. He was desperately unlucky to miss out on a place in the Grand Final, having acquitted himself without fault in the semi-final. The ultimate team-man, we look forward to Sam's game progressing to another level next season.

Special mention must also be made of Nikhil Badkundri and Rohan Thukral who made valuable contributions to the team over the course of the season, and their support during the finals was greatly appreciated.

The team extends its sincere thanks to scorer, Simon Walters, who has been by our side since day one. It is a pleasure to have him on the scorebook, and his MCA premiership medal will sit handsomely alongside numerous VSDCA medals. Additionally, photographers Mim & Jeff Davies have gone to the ends of the earth to document our successes, for which we will be forever grateful.

This season's premiership is testament to the ethos of the team, which has been a constant ever since inception. Established by Andy Stanford, this spirit has been respected and nurtured by each squad member, and it was a thrill to see the new recruits fit in seamlessly. All are eager to make it back-to-back flags in 2018/19!

JG CRAIG UNDER 15 XI REPORT

It has been a hugely successful season for Malvern Juniors with 22 teams taking to the field in the Inner South East Cricket competition.

The season brought with it substantial change, with the new Cricket Australia modified rules being implemented across the U11 age group. Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act of Victoria. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Association Incorporation Act of Victoria and other mandatory professional reporting requirements.

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The report is also prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this report:

(a) Income Tax

No provision for Income Tax has been raised as the club is exempt from Income Tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are carried at cost, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amounts of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the club commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal.

The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

(c) Goods & Services Tax (GST)

GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as

part of an item of expense. Receivables and Creditors in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

(d) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The club is lucky to have Adrian Preston and Peter Riddell as its umpires for the lower grades. We thank them for their contribution this year while recognising their contribution over many years.

Finally, fellow committee members this year were thanked for their contribution this year. Having notified his intention not to seek re-election as President he wished the Club and the newly elected President well for the future.

The President introduced the new President, David Priddle, and invited to him to address the meeting.

VSDCA MATTERS

As one of the club delegates last year to the VSDCA, David paid particular attention to recent developments. He noted the regional model produced by Cricket Victoria will continue with 2 new regions being established next year. The VSDCA remains outside the model and may suffer financially as a consequence. Fortunately, the Cricket Victoria committee members will change significantly so it is hoped that a more sympathetic position will be taken in respect to the VSDCA competition.

Of the new rule changes, the fourths will be affected with a greater number of one day games, mainly prior to Christmas, and two day games in the new year. With respect to the firsts, a player point system will be introduced. A team may not exceed 22 points on the day of competition. Each team member will have a point assessment made from criteria designated in the Rules. The competition is trying to even the player quality distribution through the implementation of this Rule.

David noted that the long serving VSDCA President, Jack Sheahan, will retire this year. He provided great leadership and stability for our competition.

In his closing remarks David complimented E Dunne on his outstanding contribution to the Club during his incumbency. He ensured that out relations with Stonnington Council remain on very good and respectful terms. The Club has benefited from the good governance and leadership he has provided.

Mick Arbon, a former President, long serving committee member and a very effective contributor behind the scenes in key areas of administration and recruitment will be sorely missed. He thanked him for his contribution.

Also, Damian Hale and Tim Arbon have retired from the committee having been major contributors to the Club's social activities. He thanked them and expressed the hope that they would continue to contribute next season both on and off the field.

He thanked other retiring committee members for their contribution to the Club.

BY LAWS OF THE MALVERN CRICKET CLUB INC.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

Full Season Where a person's annual subscription is unpaid by the first Monday in November, the Committee of Management may suspend that person's membership of the Club, thus making him ineligible for selection, and such suspension will continue until full payment is made.

Incomplete Season However where a person has either commenced playing after the start of the season or has had an interrupted season then the full payment of subscriptions shall not be required until such person has both:

been available for selection; and been selected to play

in a total five (5) days of cricket.

AWARDS

Club Championship An award to be known as the WA Willats Club Championship Award shall be determined using the following points system:

Twelve (12) points for each wicket taken;

one (1) point for each run made;

eight (8) points for each catch taken/stumping made;

eight (8) points for each run out affected (points shared if more than one fieldsman involved)

and the winner shall be the player who accumulates the highest number of points in all VSDCA First XI matches as at the end of the season. Where two or more players finish on the same total of points, the Award shall be shared.

Player of the Year An award to be known as the Lawrie Chapple Player of the Year Trophy shall be awarded to the player who finishes with the highest number of points in First, Second, Third and Fourth XI matches as at the end of the home and away season. The points system shall be that system used to determine the winner of the Club Championship Award. Where two or more players finish on the same number of votes, the Award shall be shared between them.

Batting Averages Each senior team shall have a Batting Average Award. To qualify for the Award, a batsman must have:

played a total of at least half as many innings as the most innings played by a batsman in that team for that season; and

scored a total of at least 150 runs for that season noting that this requirement will not apply where no one scores at least 150 runs for that team.

Averages shall be calculated as at the end of the season.

Bowling Averages Each senior team shall have a Bowling average Award. To qualify for the Award, a bowler must have:

bowled at least one third as many overs as are bowled by the bowler who bowls the most overs for that team during that season; and

taken at least 15 wickets for that team during that season noting that this requirement will not apply where no one takes at least 15 wickets for that team.

Averages shall be calculated as at the end of the season. Any incomplete overs are to count as full overs.

The First XI Bowling Average award shall be known as the Len Hoad Trophy.

Fielding Awards An award, to be known as the LHS Thompson Award, shall be awarded to the fieldsman who receives the highest number of votes from the Captains of either the First or Second XI teams. Where two or more fieldsmen receive the same number of votes, the Award shall be shared.

An award, to be known as the Len Begbie Award, shall be awarded to the fieldsman who receives the highest number of votes from the Captains of either the Third or Fourth XI teams. Where two or more fieldsmen receive the same number of votes, the Award shall be shared.

Votes shall be given at the conclusion of all home and away matches according to the following formula: one player receives 3 votes and one player 1 vote;

one player receives 3 votes and one player receives 3 votes; two players each receive 1 vote; one player receives 1 vote; no players receive votes.

Club Badges A player shall qualify for a club badge if, at the end of the season, he has:

scored at least 350 runs;

taken at least 30 wickets:

taken at least 30 catches and/or stumpings;

scored at least 200 runs and taken at least 15 wickets:

scored at least 200 runs and taken either 15 catches or stumpings.

A player must qualify due to achievements in either the VSDCA or the MCA. Runs, wickets, catches or stumpings achieved in the two competitions may not be combined for the purpose of qualification for a club badge.

Most Valuable Player An award to be known as the Ron Howland Most Valuable Player Award shall be determined on votes given (on a 3, 2 and 1 basis) at the completion of each game by each player. The winner shall be the player who finishes with the highest number of votes as at the end of the home and away season. Where two or more players finish on the same number of votes, the Award shall be shared between them.

First Century in the First XI An award to be known as the Estate of J. Beattie Trophy shall be awarded to the player who makes the first century in the VSDCA First XI.

Most Improved Player An award to be known as the H.W. & F.C. Bailey Memorial Trophy shall be made to the most improved player as determined by the Committee of Management.

Best Clubperson Award An award to be known as the Ewan Willis Best Clubperson Award shall be made to the best clubperson as determined by the Committee of Management.

Most Outstanding Performance An award shall be given to the player(s) that produces the most outstanding performance as determined by the Committee of Management.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Any member, upon playing their 200th senior game with the club (or as soon as practical thereafter), shall be considered by the Committee for recommendation as a Life Member of the Club. Any member of the Club, who may not have met the playing qualification but who is regarded as having performed exceptional service to the Club, also may be considered by the Committee for recommendation as a Life Member of the Club.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

The selection committee shall consist of the Captains of the four elevens in addition to a member chosen by the Committee of Management. The Committee of Management shall determine the Chairman of Selectors who shall have a casting vote. Each remaining selector shall have one vote.

SEAL REGISTER

A seal register shall be kept by the Secretary to record all instruments upon which the Club's Common Seal is affixed. Those members of the Committee of Management who attest the affixing of the Common Seal to any instrument shall initial the corresponding entry in the seal register.

DELEGATES

Members to act as delegates of the Club shall be appointed on an annual basis by the Committee of Management.

PLAYER AVAILABILITY

(a) Where a player fails to attend a match in which he has been selected, that player will be suspended for a minimum of two matches unless he:

has informed a member of the selection committee by 9.00am on the relevant game day or, can show that he has made all reasonable efforts to do so.

For the purpose of the above, attendance shall be deemed to be presence at the match at the scheduled start of play.

(b) Where a player is unavailable for selection without providing cause deemed reasonable by the Selection Committee, when next available for selection, that player will be selected in an eleven lower than that in which he would have been selected when first unavailable. In determining reasonableness, the Selection Committee will have regard to unexpected work or personal commitments.
